

January Sees the Return of a Full-scale Wassail

The annual Wassail returns on **Saturday 14th January**, unrestricted by the Covid precautions which curtailed previous events. So grab a torch, don boots, warm clothes, make your Wassail hat, find an old pan and a stick to bang it with, then you're all set for this celebratory ancient festival. Wassails have been enjoying an ever-growing revival in community orchards across Devon and elsewhere. Although the tradition goes back hundreds of years, its essential message of thanking nature for its bounty is very much in tune with today's better understanding of how important it is to look after the natural world, if we want it to look after us.

In the dark days of mid-winter, this is a great opportunity to come together for a joyful celebration. We meet at the side of the Coop in Burns Lane at 5:30pm, where we limber up our vocal cords for the old English Wassail carols (song sheets provided) that perform part of the ceremony that is to come.

We then process into the Millennium Meadow, banging pots and pans to drive out any evil sprites and spirits, to find the orchard's trees lit by candles. Here, we symbolically join with our sister orchard in Galpin Street.

The evil spirits having been driven out, the blessing of the trees can take place. Mother Orchard, a.k.a. Charlotte Rathbone, will invite Modbury's Wassail King and Queen (Oscar Parnell and

Sophie Perry) to lead the ceremony. Central to the celebration is a special oak Wassail cup, hand turned by local craftsman, Steve Headley. Into the cup, filled with apple juice from the orchard, is dipped a piece of bread which is then placed, by the King and Queen in a fork of the selected apple tree. Apple juice or cider is then poured from the Wassail Cup onto the roots of the tree representing a cycle of life. The traditional Wassail carols are sung by all during the ceremony. Modbury's trees are then blessed by the vicar of St. George's, Matt Rowland.

Wassail is an old Norse greeting meaning "be of good health" to which the response is "Drink hael." Regular Wassailers have taken to giving the response every time they hear the word Wassail.


Wassail was always an excuse for a celebratory drink or three and in that tradition, after the ceremony, hot mulled apple juice and hot dogs are provided, free of charge. Donations are welcome to cover the cost of this and other orchard-related community activities.

If you are wondering how to make a Wassail hat it's easy. Just decorate any hat with sprigs of leaves or berries from the hedgerow and any other eclectic baubles that take your fancy. Voila!

The Leaving of Modbury – Goodbye to an Old Friend of our Town

On the Modbury grapevine I heard recently that a very long term resident of Modbury, Ann Cooke, is moving to pastures new, so I thought that I might have a chat and find out why she is leaving and where she is going. On arriving at her house on Traine Terrace at the top of Galpin Street, it became obvious that she could not better the view that she is blessed with over Modbury and up to Little Modbury, so there must be a good reason. There is, she is moving to Portishead near Bristol to be near her son, Reuben, and his wife, Helen, and family.



Ann grew up and lived in far-away Ermington until she married, when she and her husband, Ron, moved to Modbury in 1969, some 53 years ago. Her family were the Blacklers of Ermington, and her father, and then Ann, were both bell ringers in the Ermington Church. On leaving school, Ann trained as a tailoress and worked at Dingles in Plymouth, which she continued for many a year from Modbury. They moved to Brooke House, and then Comery House, and has lived in her present house for 48 years. Ann tells me that Modbury was smaller then, very friendly as now, with a florist, more antique shops, and an exquisite small baker where the jeweller is now and whose pasties were to die for. There were many more buses, and far fewer cars and lorries in those days.

She rapidly became involved in Modbury life, their son, Reuben, attended Modbury School and Ann soon found herself as a Meal Time Assistant at the school, on the PTA, and on the Memorial Hall Committee. She was the Treasurer for the May Fair and the Modbury Pantomime for over 40 years, and as if that wasn't enough she tells me she was involved in Guide Dogs for the Blind for many years as the local Chairperson, as both a fund raiser and puppy walker. She was never home, she says. Ron was a coach driver for Stevens, as well as being a Modbury volunteer fireman. In recognition of all this charity work, in 2015 she was invited to a

Buckingham Palace Garden Party; her proudest moment she says.

I asked Ann what she does now as it was becoming obvious that she is still not content to be idle. She does a lot of knitting for charities she says, both local and foreign, and has lately gathered toys and sent them to Ukraine. She used to knit covers for those babies she called "Fish & Chip Babies" because they were sent home from maternity units wrapped in newspaper! She never misses the Modbury seniors' lunches, enjoys the craft fair and coach trips. I asked how she could replicate all this activity in Portishead, but this does not worry her. As well as her son and family with two grandchildren, and Freddie their dog, Ann has a friend there whom she met on one of her holidays and who tells her she won't have time for any knitting and suchlike, we'll be having too much fun! On leaving, I was certain that Modbury will miss her, but was happy in the knowledge that she will enjoy her new life in Portishead. I'm sure we all wish her well in her move.

Will 2023 see a New Year Resolution for Palm Cross?

I certainly hope so and, at last, the signs are promising. As we enter 2023 I am in my fifth year of the long running campaign, on behalf of Palm Cross residents and the Modbury community to have the landscaping of this beautifully-situated site finished according to what was legally agreed to when the development was approved.


At the end of last year, the lumps of rock (leftover from site excavations during building) were replaced with proper boulders. Trees were finally planted around the pond in Phase Two. This area will be meadow-seeded in the spring, after the virulent weeds in the soil's natural seed bank have been removed to give the new seeds a chance.



Although not part of the original plans, the verge at the entrance to the emergency access road, that leads to the allotments from Barracks Road, is also to be prepared and wild flower seeded. The wall itself is to be disguised to make it more attractive for all the parents and children who regularly pass it on their way to and from school. Modbury Bloomers have volunteered to plant climbers at the base of the wall to give attractive year-round cover. Training wires for the climbers have already been installed so the Bloomers team can't wait to enhance yet another scruffy corner of Modbury.

The upper pond in Phase One silted up long ago. The result is that there is no visibility of what you would normally expect to see in a pond... water. Silt removal and restoration of this area is currently under discussion on how best to proceed, along with discussions about improvements to parts of the paths.

I'm crossing my fingers that the resolution of outstanding issues is one new year resolution that will be kept.



MODBURY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

An abbreviated report of the Modbury Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 6th December 2022, 7:00pm at The Pavilion, QEII Recreation Field. The full minutes will be MODB available on the Parish Notice Board and website in due course.



Eight Parish Councillors were present along with eight members of the public.

Public Forum: The public forum was dominated by discussion about the forthcoming road closures in Modbury covering the period January to April 2023 for replacement of the Victorian sewers. Rufus Gilbert, from Devon County Council, stated that the road closures were South West Water's responsibility and apologised for no one from Devon Highways being present at the public meeting on the 22nd November. Since that meeting, further discussions have taken place between Devon County Council (DCC), South West Water (SWW) and Modbury Parish Council (MPC). SWW are submitting a new road management proposal which will allow traffic/deliveries to access Modbury and the car park with one way traffic in certain areas of the town, but not through traffic, which will have to follow the diversion around the town.

Concern was raised by the possibility of HGVs getting to Modbury and finding the road closed and having to turn round. The Devon County Councillor was challenged on the poor level of communication from them concerning the road closure. It was stressed by the public at the forum, that this will be the most major disruption to Modbury for a very long time and people need to work together to get through the issues that it will bring.

SWW is funding high visibility jackets for school children walking to school and also a crossing person which the school will need to appoint. DCC was asked to refresh the yellow lines by the school.

DCC was at the meeting to listen and praised MPC on their hard work finding a way forward with the SWW work

South Hams District Council Report: Bernard Taylor gave his apologies.

Parish Council Report:

New footpath from the War Memorial to Palm Cross Green. The new owner of the house up from the War Memorial is willing to work with Modbury Parish Council to see if a footpath can be made connecting the War Memorial to the path up by Palm Cross Green. The first step is to clear the area to see what is there.

An application which was too late to make the agenda, but would be out of time by the January meeting, was discussed. It concerned a resubmission of a tool store that was now approx half the size of the original application. This was approved, but with the withdrawal of residential rights.

Modbury Parish

Bridleway 11 - the sealed surface was approved provided it was suitable for horses.

Finance Committee: Due to the unknown state of Devon County Council's finances, the setting of the precept will be left as late as possible and agreed at the January Council meeting which is on the 24th January 2023.

A parishioner had suggested that the council purchase two fields as a community woodland or dog run area. These fields are next to Runaway Lane and are up for sale for offers around £175000. This will be investigated by a MPC working party.

It was agreed to go with the lowest quote for the work for the oak tree in Galpin Street as both parties had done work for the council before and the only difference in the work was the price.

Neighbourhood Plan: The external examiner has come back with some comments that were, generally, minor changes to text. However, the examiner also had recommended removal of the principal home provision for the following reasons.

- a) At present there are very few second homes in Modbury
- b) Lack of clarity on gathering information about second homes going forward

As the principal home provision was something that had been commented on by people of Modbury it was agreed to leave the provision in but include the examiners comments.

P3 Report: The team have undertaken a lot of maintenance work in the last month and major improvement works have been carried out by a contractor in Runaway Lane"?

Barracks Road Safety: As mentioned above, SWW are providing high visibility jackets for Modbury schoolchildren and funding a crossing patrol.

River Pollution: Members of the council have attended various meetings around the area concerning river pollution and are looking to join up with other groups so that the combined concerns carry more weight with the various bodies responsible.

Homes for Ukraine: two further Ukrainian families are now in Modbury, having moved from Holbeton, at the end of their original six months sponsorship.

Language support is to be provided for the Ukrainian families. The challenge will be next year when the present 6 months placements run out and other sponsors are sought within Modbury. Anyone interested in helping, please contact the Parish Clerk.


The part one meeting ended at 9.15.

May Fair Finale Sees Modbury Become ONE-BIG-STREET Party ... and Everyone's Invited

The end of this year's May Fair will coincide with the additional bank holiday on Monday 8th May, declared to



celebrate King Charles' coronation. It gives us a great opportunity to demonstrate that Modbury is at its best when we all come together as a community.

Appropriately for the coronation, this year's May Fair theme is 'Countries of the Commonwealth' of which the King is head. Cities, towns and villages across the UK will be celebrating. Street parties, on major national occasions, are a Modbury tradition dating back to Queen Victoria and more recently for VE day (socially distanced in lock-down) and for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee last summer.

But not every street in Modbury can hold a party either because of traffic movements or Modbury's many steep hills. But we have found a way to solve that.

For one day only, on **Monday May 8th** the May Fair team will create a circular pop-up street (our own Coronation Street) at the recreation and sports field. Individual streets, or groups of streets, will be invited to set up their own party around the circle's perimeter, making ONE-BIG-STREET Party with live music, entertainment, family games and as much fun as we can pack into a single afternoon. All for free.

The idea is simple. Rather than just those who can hold a party in their street, everyone brings their street to the party.

Further details will be announced as plans proceed. . . but save the date.



Winter Wildlife in the Garden



After experiencing record high temperatures in the UK this summer we experienced a deep chill in December and there could be more of that to come. We humans can wrap up warm, have hot drinks and stay inside if we need to, but what challenges do our garden birds and mammals face at this time of year?

In general, chances of survival through winter are helped by starting the season in good health and condition, and our garden friends need to be able to find shelter, clean water and food unless, like hedgehogs and bats, they enter a phase of hibernation. Prolonged freezing of water supplies are a serious threat to survival, so do check that fresh water is always

available, and not just ice. Garden birds have few insects to feed on in winter and will really appreciate clean, full seed and peanut feeders, fat balls and even meal worms (if you are feeling generous!)

We know we have an active breeding population of hedgehogs in Modbury, as Phil Jolly has gathered data from the hedgehog count for the last two summers on behalf of Modbury Wildlife Action Group. Hedgehogs hibernate during winter months in sheltered spaces such as woodpiles, under sheds, or in hedgehog houses provided by gardeners trying to help these charming creatures. However, they do wake up periodically if the weather turns mild, and then they need water and any food they can find. If you see a hedgehog or new hedgehog droppings during winter months, do leave out food and water overnight until it is no longer eaten.

Recycling - Where Does it All Go?

I bumped into Bernard Taylor on Brownston Street the other day and we got talking about South Hams recycling issues. I then asked him what happened to it all because I didn't know, and was somewhat skeptical that it was disposed of properly. He assured me it was and gave me a few examples. This sounded interesting so I asked him if he could let me have a full list to reassure me that it is carried out properly and really makes all our household sorting of recyclables worthwhile. This he has done and the answers are fascinating and to my mind, justify all the sorting we all do.

Initially all the kerb-side recycling is collected weekly and taken to Ivybridge Transfer Station where it is bulk sorted by the type of material. Each recyclable material type is then sent for recycling at the following locations.

Mixed plastics and metals in our white sacks are sent for further sorting at *Kenbury Wood Material Recovery Facility (MRF)* just outside Exeter. This is operated by *Coastal Recycling*, and uses a variety of mechanical and manual sorting techniques to separate the various types of plastics and metals from one another. The *MRF* also removes all non-recyclables that have been mistakenly included in our **white sacks**. These non-recyclables are bulked and sent for disposal at the *Energy from Waste Facility* in Plymouth (see later).

After this bulk sorting, individual types of recyclables are sent to the **final re-processor** for that material, as follows:

HDPE Plastics (High-density Polyethylene). Examples of these are shampoo bottles, plastic toys, milk jugs, grocery bags, and cereal box liners. Final re-processor is Veolia, in Dagenham

PET (Polyethylene terephthalate) **Plastics** are a type of clear, strong, lightweight and 100% recyclable plastic. Unlike other types of plastic, PET plastic is not single-use -- it is 100% recyclable, versatile, and is made to be remade. PET plastic is safe for food wrapping etc. It is commonly used in bottles and other plastic containers including soda bottles, water bottles, peanut butter jars and even in frozen foods packaging. Final re-processor is *Cleantech*, in Lincolnshire.

Aluminium Cans and Foil: Final re-processor for us is *Novells* Recycling in Cheshire.

Steel Cans: Final re-processor is *British Steel*, at Port Talbot.

Paper: The final re-processor is Palm Recycling in Shropshire

Cardboard: Final re-processor is Newbery Recycling Ltd, in Barnstaple

Glass: (including bottle banks) final re-processor is Recresco Ltd. In Cwmbran

Batteries: Final re-processor is *Ecobat*, in the West Midlands

Printer Cartridges: Final re-processor is BCMY in Littlehampton

Textiles: (including clothing banks) Final re-processor is The Salvation Army

All these recyclables are commodities that can and do generate an income for the Council, which is used to subsidise collections and other services. By separating recycling by type at the kerbside, as we do here in Modbury, we maintain a better quality product, which is easier and less costly to recycle. SHDC works closely with their contractor, FCC Environment, to ensure that our recyclables, where possible, are kept within the UK.


Food Caddies: The contents of these are tipped by the collection vehicles at Ivybridge Transfer Station where it is bulked and delivered to Antidigestion's Anaerobic Digestion facility at Holsworthy. The material is broken down in a series of oxygen-free tanks to produce methane, a gas used to produce electricity and Digestate, a nutrient rich fertilizer used by local farmers.


Garden Waste: Garden waste collected from households is taken to and tipped at Torr Quarry Transfer Station before being bulked and taken to South West Composting, Brixton. Here it is composted in large heaps, which are turned every few weeks to improve breakdown. The resulting compost is used on local farmland.

Residual Waste: The contents of the **Grey Bins and Seagull Sacks** are tipped by the collection vehicles at Torr Quarry Transfer Station where it is bulked. It is then taken to **MVV's Energy from Waste (EfW), and Combined Heat & Power (CHP) facility in Plymouth.** Some waste from the west of the district is also delivered direct to MVV. The waste is used as a fuel to heat water into superheated steam, which turns a turbine to create electricity. Left over energy from this process is also used to heat the nearby dockyard and naval base.

After digesting all this local information, I am now very happy that what we are doing is well worthwhile. I look forward to the final outcome of the Garden Waste debacle.

- 1. Please note that if the wind is above 20 knots the intended flag hoists will not take place.
- 2. The intended flag hoists will not take place if the Modbury Chief Yeoman is absent.
- 3. All the signal hoists are done using the various Country/National Ensigns and the International Code of Signals Flags.
- 4. Starboard Yardarm (Plymouth)-West will have the event wording, (which sometimes is abbreviated only 7 or 8 flags can be flown).
- 5. Port Yardarm (Modbury)-East will have the year. Answer Pennant (Ans) will indicate the start (when at the top) or end (when at the bottom).
- 6. 1st ,2nd ,3rd substitute flags will be used whenever a flag flown earlier/higher in the hoist is to be repeated. e.g. 2022 = 2,0,1stsub,3rdsub.
- 7. If there is a significant event which does take place, additional signal flag hoists will be arranged, subject to the note 1 above.
