Fifty-two years since its re-instatement, and 713 years since it began, May Fair came around again, but it was not quite in its usual format, due to the Coronation of King Charles III on 6th May, so the Carnival and Market started the Fair rather than ended it. All regular events took place and were well attended. Only the One-Big-Street party was cancelled by the weather.

It was indeed a Marvellous Modbury May Fair to remember. The carnival was long and colourful with the vintage cars and Commonwealth flags. The pubs were fully booked for their quizzes, and the Brownies had to turn people away from the Bingo! As to the Modbury Mile Fun run, did you see all those children running? 130 children out of 190 runners in all!

At the crowning, we elevated our new Modbury Royalty: King Daniel White, ably assisted by Theo Barker, and Queen Florence Cater with her attendants Isobel Rowland and Pia Sullivan. Lots of

fun and games at the Crowning, with a long queue at the Twinning Association's creperie stall, followed by a big crowd in the Meadow to race the ducks. Apparently, the first duck over the line was that of the Town Crier, David Scott, but it wasn't a fix – honest!

As usual, the organising team was small, but there are a great many people, all volunteers, who came forward to ensure the Fair took place. So, we thank each and every one of the people who helped, be it persons who changed road-closed signs, put road-closed signs out, acted as road marshals, put up market stalls, herded ducks, put up bunting, made carnival costumes, made music, organised events, decorated shop windows, held quizzes, the list goes on and on, you are all amazing. And of course, we thank you, the people of Modbury for turning up to the events, you really reward the work of the team.




Please note that there is a May Fair

MODBURY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of the Modbury Parish Council Meeting Tuesday 9th May 2023, 7.00 pm, The Pavilion, QEII Recreation Field, Modbury.

All six members of the new Parish Council were present, along with Bernard Taylor, the South Hams District Councillor, and six members of the public. Rufus Gilbert, the Devon County Councillor, sent his apologies, but had provided a written report.

Modbury Parish Council AGM

The Meeting started with the Modbury Parish Council AGM. Peter Watts took the Chair as out-going chair, while a vote was taken to elect a new chair. The new Chair is Barbara Price, with Phil Smith as Vice Chair. Peter Watts was thanked by the new Chair and Council for all his hard work over his years on the Council. Two people had applied to be co-opted onto the Council and after a private debate the two were duly appointment. The new Councillors are Dave Trigger and Gerry McAllister. The new Parish Council now consists of eight members out of a possible 12. Consequently, anyone who would like to apply for co-option on the Council, please contact the Parish Clerk.

The AGM continued with Councillors being appointed to the various Parish Council Committees and a review of policies and council documents was made. Details of who was appointed to which Committee can be found from the Parish Council minutes available on the Modbury Parish Council website https://modburyparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Singalonga Superstar - Modbury Memorial Hall 12th & 13th May

One luxury cruise ship, two warring couples and three, yes three, Dolly Partons – the unlikely ingredients for this year's Mayfair Singalong show, an event returning after 4 years of COVID-enforced absence. A sequel to 2019's Singalonga Sunshine, also written by Jeremy Hibbard, it continued the story of Derek and Margaret Claypole, a down-to-earth Yorkshire couple who unwittingly got caught up in a jewel robbery while camping in Devon. A few of the stolen jewels 'accidentally' found their way into Margaret's pocket, enabling her and Derek to fund the luxury cruise they'd always wanted.

'Superstar finds them at the start of their cruise, excited at the prospect of winning the ship's talent competition and a first prize of yet another cruise for the following year. Dave Fardon and Liz Edwards brilliantly reprised their roles as Derek and Margaret with Angie Tall and show producer Peter Lowe slipping perfectly back into character as the jewel thieves Diana and Hugh. With the criminals having escaped jail and now terrified of reprisals from their gang, they soon fall under the spell of the wily Margaret who manages to convince them she has some powerful connections in the criminal underworld.

There were plenty of laughs in Act 1 as Derek and Margaret adjusted to life on board, meeting enthusiastic Ship's Entertainment Officer Gail Roper (Boony Bower) and their own private butler Gerrard, a perfectly cast Nigel Guild. The songs came thick and fast in Act 2, where we moved to the ship's night club for the big talent competition. Musical Director Jo Highley and her band were on fine form with cast (and audience) belting out Dancing with the Captain, Crocodile Rock, Here You Come Again and, appropriately for Eurovision Weekend, an energetic (and revealing) rendition of Making Your Mind Up. An extended encore saw Boony Bower singing Mama Cass's Own kind of Music and Sarah Walker lighting up the room with the second of her two Dolly Parton numbers, Nine to Five. Finally cast and crew united for a rousing renditon of Is this the way to Amarillo?

Once again, so many members of Modbury's community gave up their precious time and remarkable talents to produce an evening of funny, engaging, musical entertainment. The chorus line of Chris Birch, Steve Dawes, Sarah Walker, Sarah Wyatt, Jo Woodcock, Alice Thornton, Sarah Hart, Sian Walker-McAllister and Sally Taylor had spent months in rehearsal with Sally also working hard behind the scenes on a wardrobe of great costumes. Richard Mitchell's ambitious set, painted and brought to life by Gill Eason and Gerry McAllister, was a triumph and it was no mean feat for the stage team of Sue Grist, Pauline Ryder and Lily Edwards, to get it





it into place every night. With lighting by Joely and Zizi Hibbard, sound by Poppy Edwards and projection by Andrea Kuhn this was also a true family effort – with a whole cast of others, too numerous to mention here, in support.

It was also a first outing for the Memorial Hall's new sound-deadening installations, aimed at reducing echo in the auditorium and making it easier to balance live voices with the band. It's taken a lot of time and effort to find the right design and materials to improve sound in the hall but each part of the auditorium now has equal clarity, opening the door to even more ambitious shows in the future. With those improvements made and this calibre of entertainment on offer, the future of home-grown, local entertainment in Modbury looks very bright indeed.

SPRING REPORT 2023 Modbury Wildlife Action Group

ModWAG have been busy over the winter sowing yellow rattle and wildflower seeds on the Churchyard, Church Lane verges and in the school sensory garden. By the time you read this, if you tread carefully

around the edges of the areas marked by signs, you will hopefully see the young flowering plants; and later in the summer the benefit they and the flowering grasses are giving to numerous insects, butterflies, moths and birds.

Already seen this spring thanks to leaving the area in the SW corner of the Churchyard uncut, we have seen Cowslips, False oxlips, Primroses, Violets, Cuckoo pint, Cuckoo flower, Greater Stitchwort, Celandines, Dandelions, Bluebells and Speedwell. Yellow rattle seeded in the southern area should reduce the mass of grass to allow more wildflowers through next year. This all takes time! The more different native

species we can encourage, the more diverse the insects and bird life will be.

On the Church Lane verge, we have removed the daffodil bulbs very close to the road and will replant these further back in the autumn. We hope you enjoyed the spring colour this year, it should become better every year as the daffodils spread.





The **Yellow Rattle** we planted in winter 2021 has come up (thanks to the verge being left uncut last summer) and some is already flowering; along with **Cuckoo flower**, **Geraniums**, **Primroses**, **Plantains**, **Speedwell** and many other species. We hope by the time you read this that this area will have been left uncut or the **Yellow Rattle** will not flower and so is unable to contribute to a meadow this year or next, as it is an annual plant. There is a snake shape of meadow seeding around the large tree and in front of the evergreen magnolia to look out for too.

Diary of a local Beekeeper – Wet Springs and Swarming

Once again, adverse weather conditions play havoc with the bees' spring honey production

It is with a sad sense of deja-vu, that we find ourselves once again having to cope with a wet and miserable spring. Two years ago, I was bemoaning a similar set of adverse circumstances and noted at the time that they played havoc with the normal blossoming of spring, to the effect that the bees could not easily forage in the cold, damp conditions, and even when they did venture out, there was precious little pollen and nectar to collect. Well, here we go again it seems.

One piece of good news – all our hives got through winter successfully, mainly due to Justine and I regularly topping up their honey stores with lots of special syrup, containing nutritious ambrosia, as well as packs of fondant. However, we had to continue topping up their food during April too, due to the continuing cold weather restricting the bees' post-hibernation foraging sprees. There has been a bumper crop of oil-seed rape sown this year and we were hoping that the bees would take full advantage of it. But the bright yellow flowers are fading quite quickly now, and we are not at all sure quite how much rape honey has been successfully acquired as yet. Our regular food checks just confirmed that the bees have preferred to raid their in-house stores rather than undertake foraging expeditions in the rain.





So it was with some surprise, during our first proper internal hive checks of the new season in early May, that we discovered lots of budding queen cells in several colonies, despite the presence of queens hatched only last year. It was obvious to us as well, that two or three of these colonies were on the cusp of swarming, even though the weather was hardly encouraging. We are not sure quite why the bees would seek to build queen cells in such numbers so early in the season, but perhaps they were feeling bored cooped up in the hive and needed an outlet for their energies – we can but guess!

Nonetheless, it was clear that something had to be done to mitigate the situation, so Justine and I decided to implement a method known as a 'controlled swarm' with three of the most acute hives. This involves removing the existing queen from the hive, along with lots of young bees and food and placing them into a small nucleus hive, which is then relocated to another site over 5 miles away, in order to prevent the flying bees returning to the original hive. Meanwhile, two queen cells nearly at hatching point are left in the original hive and when eventually the new queen returns from her mating flight she is expected to be fully accepted by the colony, meaning we have gained another hive. Yet, should the newly hatched queen fail for some reason, it will still be perfectly possible to re-unite the two colonies - very much a win-win situation stock-wise.

Justine and I will have to make a judgement call in the next couple of weeks on how much oil-seed rape honey we can safely take off. But we hope that there will be some jars available for sale in the Post Office by early June. Let's all hope the weather warms up soon, so nature can catch up.

An Apothecral Tail

Novum stagnum in Roslin Villa - Vernum

The churchyard is a joy with the glow of primroses and **lesser celandine**. The lesser celandine (*Ficaria verna*) is also known as pilewort and has apparently been used for 1000s of years for treating piles and anal fissures. Seemingly a native plant and mentioned in Culpepper's herbal (1647) though not featured in contemporary medicine.

Around the new pond at Roslin Cottage I have instead chosen a superficially similar but quite different plant - **winter aconite** (*Eranthus hyemalis*)

I chose this plant as much for its name as its early colourful appearance. **Aconite** is a medicinal plant known since ancient times and mentioned by many authors. It even featured in my own undergraduate syllabus. Hopefully , the aconite also known as monkshood, wolf's bane, leopard's bane, mouse bane, women's bane, devil's helmet, and queen of poisons will appear around the pond later in the year.

Meanwhile, more on the **winter aconite** which gets its name merely by having leaves which resemble those of monkshood but is otherwise not closely related. In the 16th century it was normal to classify plants by appearance.



Winter aconite is not native to this country. It was first documented as growing wild in the 18th century. I cannot see any reference to it in Nicholas Culpeper's Complete Herbal (written around 1649)

Winter aconite is toxic but with a different chemical composition to its deadly namesake. It contains khelin which can be converted into sodium cromoglycate used in the treatment of asthma and allergies. (Well known especially under the brand name "Opticrom") Khelin can also be converted into amiodarone which is used in the treatment of atrial fibrillation. Due to its toxicity winter aconite has rarely been used in medicine, so don't try this at home.


