





#### The Kit Hillbillies

The Kit Hillbillies are a four-piece band originating from the Tamar Valley area, in the shadow of Kit Hill. Formed over 15 years ago by Neil (banjo), Gordon (fiddle/mandolin) in Calstock, joined by Chris (guitar) from Tavistock and now Steve (bass) from Kingston.

The band feature rollicking bluegrass and good-time acoustic roots tunes as well as feel-good bluegrass with soaring old-time vocal harmonies.

Old-timey, good-timey bluegrass, with rousing vocal harmonies that smuggle in some frankly inappropriate local references. Vigorously expressive and irresistibly tappy on the toes, with a crisp rhythmic finish. Think Betty Stogs, rather than Harvey's Bristol Cream.

Their music has been described as the sound of Woody Guthrie chasing Earl Scruggs in a stolen hay lorry. A simpler summary came from the Guardian journalist Tim Dowling: "The Kit Hillbillies: Excellent. See them soon".

**Boomers:** Support Band, Boomers, are a familiar sight in Modbury, featuring Mike on guitar and vocals, Boony on guitar and vocals, Sarah on vocals and percussion and Rob on mandolin and occasional vocals. Their music is an eclectic mix of old and new, mostly well known, so feel free to sing along.



#### Nigel Toms, Modbury's own First Responder

One of our Modbury Parish Councillors suggested that I should have a chat (for the Messenger) with a very special person in Modbury, on whom we can always depend when in trouble health-wise. While I have actually seen Nigel Toms in action on more than one occasion reviving someone in need of help, I had never met him so I set about arranging a meeting with him. Simple I thought, but not so, as Nigel is so busy responding to emergency medical or trauma calls. It was only after several days that there came a knock at my door and there was Nigel in his full ambulance service uniform, with a bit of time to spare as he unexpectedly had a gap between calls that afternoon.

Nigel is immediately an outgoing, friendly person who would put anyone at ease. He explained that he is a First Responder for the South Western Ambulance Service, and is often literally the first one to arrive on the scene in the area when a local emergency call for help has been made. He took this role on in 2010, is Modbury born and bred, and still lives here with his wife, their dog, which is a 'Sprocker' (Springer x Cocker Spaniel), and four cats. He was with our local Fire Station as the Watch Commander and also full-time at a Plymouth station. He has always been involved in emergency care, including his role as a first-aid instructor for many years. He was recruited as a first responder by South Western Ambulance Service over 15 years ago and is proud to have been able to do his bit through the COVID pandemic.

As a First Responder, he is alerted via his pager when he is on call – which seems to be most of the time. I asked about this, as it seems he has no time to himself. His policy is to limit his free time, not his volunteering hours! As he is a volunteer (no pay except fuel costs), he can and does "book himself off from time to time". On the day we were talking, for instance, he explained that he would be available until 6 pm, then would book himself off duty for time with his family, which definitely included his dog and cats, until 11 pm, then would book on again overnight for Category 1 (The most serious) emergencies only, and then on fully again at 9 am the next

day. A very full day! I asked if he had any hobbies, or even any time for them. Gardening was his answer – I suspect this is because his pager will be in his pocket.

Nigel obviously gets a real 'buzz' out of the work he does. A recent example was to a woman who had a cardiac arrest in a local town, where using CPR, (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and defibrillator, he successfully restarted her heart. Nearly a year later, while responding to an emergency, he saw her out again with her husband walking her dog. Nigel was overjoyed to see her out enjoying life again. Cardiac arrests are real emergencies and he can be there in minutes if it's a local call, but emphasised that CPR should be carried out immediately by whoever is around, until a first responder arrives. He explained that CPR is pressing rhythmically on the chest of a person lying on their back to, say, the rhythm of the Bee Gees "Staying Alive" song! And using a defibrillator if one is available.



I asked him what other sort of cases he get called out to. It seems anything that is acutely worrying or immediately life threatening such as strokes, blackouts, epilepsy, diabetic problems, major trauma accidents, or just falls by frail or elderly people. With him in his car he has analgesia, oxygen, dressing materials, lifting equipment and even has a sort of collapsible chair, which he can re-erect under a person who cannot get up, which helps them to get upright. Calls come in via 999 and are then sent to Nigel's pager by ambulance control. He showed me this ambulance cell phone type device, which uses satellite technology to direct him to actual houses, much more accurately than Satnav or GPS, thus saving valuable minutes.

This led onto me asking Nigel how should people contact the NHS if they are worried, as I've heard that the 999 call is frequently overused for minor, non urgent problems, thus preventing or delaying resources getting to serious emergencies. He confirmed this and made these suggestions:

- 1) Contact your local Health Centre, Doctor, 01548 830666, or Pharmacist 01548 830215 for general health advice, or minor worries.
- 2) Dial 111 for non-emergencies but worrying problems that may well need medical attention. A medic will answer, triage you (ask questions and assess your need), then if necessary, arrange and direct you to a doctor, or hospital etc.
- 3) Dial 999 for serious emergencies, life threatening accidents or illnesses (strokes, heart attacks, collapses etc.).

After spending a precious hour in Nigel's company, during which time his pager thankfully remained silent, it became obvious how lucky we are to have such a kind, and dependable first responder in our midst here in Modbury. I hope he's around if I ever need him!

#### **Modbury Birds**

Our summer visitors are now away, heading to warmer climates. Wasn't it great to see so many swifts around the church, well done to all involved, hopefully next year they will return and nest there. There were also lots of swallows and martins around the ponds, unfortunately the dry weather caused some of the nests to crack up and a lack of mud for rebuilding affected some nests.

We managed to add a further nine species: blackcap, black redstart, siskin, garden and willow warbler, swallow, house and sand martins and swifts - bringing the total of different species so far to 60.

Unfortunately my onomatopoeic friend, the cuckoo wasn't seen or heard here in Modbury (unless you know different), Dartmoor and Thurlestone, yes, but not here. We used to hear them in Flete Woods, so quite close and it's such a shame as every youngster should hear one, especially as they tend to herald the arrival of spring. Some have tracking devices and its allowed us to see their travels from various parts of Africa to the UK and back.

There's still a few species that have been seen in previous years, but not this: mistle thrush, redstart, stock dove, partridge and red kite. Let me know if you've seen them, also there's lots of gulls around that are difficult to recognise besides the herring gull.

And so, as the seasons change, we await our winter visitors. We are hoping to see: yellow wagtail, redwing and fieldfare and perhaps some waterbirds. Also, there have been sightings of osprey in most of the rivers nearby, and breeding programs of white tailed eagles and white storks have been released over the years and are now regularly being seen around us.

#### SATURDAY OCTOBER 4th MODBURY THERAPY CENTRE YARD, 10:00 am

Come and join in this great annual community event when we press the apples from Modbury's own Community Orchards to make the freshest, tastiest, most wholesome juice you could wish for. Take away a bottle for a small donation (to cover the cost of hiring the press and equipment).

You are welcome to join the team – no previous experience needed.

This is a fun day for families and we encourage adults and school-age children, under parental supervision, to participate. There is no shortage of tasks to help with.

It takes a team effort to wash, chop or scrat the apples, wrap them in the 'cheeses' (pressing cloths) then crank down the press and see the pure golden juice run into the tray from where it is collected in jugs.

The filled jugs are decanted into special pouches for freezing or into bottles. Some of these are pasteurised to



extend their shelf life by months, while others are left fresh for immediate consumption within a few days. The waste pulp, or pomace, is donated to the Church Lane allotments compost heap.

As well as having a fun time and meeting others in the community, you'll be helping to keep this very traditional Devon pastime alive.

It all happens in the centre of town: The pressing takes place in the Modbury Health Centre Yard by kind permission of Mandy and Andrew. It's a perfect location in the heart of the town. The blue door to the left of the Curator Café leads into the yard.

The team will start setting up for a **10:00am start**. If you have a surplus of apples, as many people do this year, you are welcome to donate them to Apple Day rather than waste them. Just bring them along on the day.



#### **Modbury Parish Council Meeting**

#### Tuesday 2nd September 2025, 7:00pm

Present were seven councillors, Cllr Louise Wainwright (Devon CC) and five members of the public. Apologies were received from Cllr Richard Foss, Cllr Ann Turner and Cllr Bernard Taylor (South Hams DC).



#### **Public Forum**

A member of the public raised the issue of the recent flooding event. It was suggested that those likely to be affected are issued more sandbags by DCC or SHDC, but it was reported that they no longer do so free of charge.

#### Matters arising from the August MPC meeting.

• MPC was successful with the grant application to SHDC for the maintenance of the town clock.

#### Report from Louise Wainwright, Devon County Councillor

- The recent flood brings into focus what is required given the climate and other issues we face. As MPC are doing, the other parishes are also updating their flood management policies.
- There will be a twice-yearly magazine drawing together all of the South Ham's 61 parishes.
- Octopus have withdrawn their planning application for a wind turbine in Bigbury as it is currently not financially viable for the local low voltage input it would provide.
- Louise Wainright is spending much time with DCC Highways department to resolve local issues.
- Louise Wainright thanked MPC for supplying her with a priority list of DCC work requested in Modbury.

#### Maintenance and Emergency Planning & Flooding

- The Modbury Emergency Plan needs to be revised to be more concise and to involve more people within the community. A Working Group is being set up and will meet at the end of September, including all the new volunteers who have responded to the notice.
- Friday's flood raised assorted issues. Prevention is important and when alerts should be given were properly considered.
- MPC met with DCC Highways management today to discuss drain clearance etc. It was pointed out that if MPC is given warning of work to be done then they could assist notice of work schedules is crucial.
- It was pointed out that street cleaning by SHDC, as a preventative measure, would be a major help.
- There is a problem with flooding near Whympston Cross because the buddle hole is blocked and the silt has built up too much to allow the flood water to drain off the road. Solutions have been proposed and the site is to be included in the forthcoming priority action DCC Highways visit.
- Tenders have been sought for the replacement of the internal fence at the Modbury Memorial Hall and the contract is expected to be finalised at the October MPC meeting.

#### Policy updates

- Health and Safety Policy: this has been updated and will henceforth be re-considered monthly.
- Grant Policy: updated to make it clear that grants cannot be made to individuals but only to community groups with their own bank account. Applications for 2026/27 must be made before 31st October 2025 so that they can be fully considered in the annual budget setting process.

#### Heritage Group

- The MPC Heritage Working Group has compiled a display on the history of traders in Modbury which is placed in the window of the Parish office.
- Work continues to improve and update the Modbury heritage website.

#### **Finance**

It was agreed to subsidise one day's free parking at Christmas in addition to the two paid for by SHDC.

#### **Christian Comment: Harvest**

It is fair to say that our experiences of Harvest will vary according to where we live and what we have known growing up. It may also be that our understanding of Harvest has changed over time. Traditionally, Harvest was a time of the community gathering to work hard at bringing in the crops which had been carefully tended throughout the summer. This would be followed by the opportunity to celebrate everyone's endeavours with a church service and a feast. For those living in rural areas, or who work in agriculture, or even perhaps those who grow fruit and vegetables in their gardens or allotments, Harvest will continue to mean much the same.

Those who live and work on the land very much know the delicate balance of the right weather, good soil and careful timing which results in a successful crop. This year our farmers have struggled with turbulent weather patterns, giving unseasonal bouts of wet and dry, hot and cold that have paid havoc with the growing crops and, in some cases, resulted in failure. A bountiful Harvest therefore is a true cause for celebration, for both the work of the farmers and the providence of God.

Those who are less connected to how our food is grown and produced will experience Harvest differently. Food is generally bought in a shop with minimal knowledge of those whose energies have gone into producing it. Equally the ability to ship produce across the globe means we are not always bound by what crops are in season and whether the weather has been kind this year.

Harvest is a time to consciously take time to pause and give thanks for the food we so often take for granted, and those who have laboured to produce it.

Our Harvest Festivals have evolved quite a bit in recent years with a greater emphasis on bringing non-perishable packets and tinned goods rather than the fat marrows, potatoes and cauliflowers of yesteryear, but the principle remains the same: to give thanks for our food, for those who have worked to produce it and for God's goodness in providing it.

Of course, our proper response to God's generosity to us is to be generous to others. Traditional Harvest Festivals included giving to the poor and needy. Today we do the same as we share our food with our Foodbank.

So please, join us in St George's, as we celebrate Harvest this month, recognising God's goodness to us.




#### The Modbury Vixens, First Ever South Hams Woman's Walking Football Team

The First Ever South Hams Woman's Walking Football Team, the

Modbury Vixens, made history in 2024 by joining the first ever Devon Woman's Walking Football League! The season commenced in September 2024 and concluded in April 2025. It was a great success.

This year The Modbury Vixens will play two teams in the Devon Woman's Walking Football League season 2025/26, with a second team called The Modbury Foxies.



Winter training moves indoors at Ivybridge Community College sports hall starting on 14th October on a Tuesday evening 6:00 pm - 7:30 pm and, for those who are hardy, we all-weather train on Sunday evenings throughout the year on the astro, but only one hour from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm.

The Modbury Vixens/Foxies are recruiting across the South Hams. We are a Ladies Walking Football Team, inaugurated in January 2024, we are open to all players of all abilities over the age of 40. The ethos of the club is Friendship, Fun, Fitness and Football.

Walking Football is the fastest growing sport in the UK and is a slightly slower, non contact sport, which provides a team environment and a friendly atmosphere for women over 40 wishing to finesse or improve their fitness and footballing skills. At the moment we have 20 players of varying ages and abilities between 40 and 74, some who have never played football before, some who are mums to football mad kids and some who played 11 a side in their younger years.

We currently have an active registered Football Association league squad of 20 players who play league games all over Devon in small mini tournaments. The games are in a 6 v 6 format of 16 minute games, and in the tournament format we play four games at each league competition. The tournaments are spaced out every couple of months throughout the autumn up to spring 2026 and games are held on a Sunday morning or afternoon.

#### The Modbury CC Season of 2025

Another summer gone, another scorebook closed, and Modbury CC emerge with six wins, seven defeats, and the vague air of men who have fought the good fight and mislaid the map halfway through. Draws, of course, are for the faint of heart — and Modbury were never going to be accused of indecision.



#### Runs on the Board

At the top of the list stands **Guy Speed**, the season's leading bat with 202 runs and a brace of fifties. When Guy is in, he lends the air of a Roman consul taking his place in the Senate — firm of jaw, immovable, and only occasionally undone by an ill-placed yorker.

**John Compston** (162 runs, one fifty) provided middle-order ballast, as reliable as a medieval stone mason and twice as solid. He also had the unnerving knack of popping up with useful bowling overs, like a Swiss army knife that insists on bowling medium pace.

With the ball, **James Sloman** led the merry assault, scooping up 15 wickets at 10.53 and doing it all with the serene air of Wellington who, finding Waterloo rather a bother, calmly ordered another pot of tea.

**Lee Merchant**, meanwhile, refused to let the batsmen have all the fun; he nabbed 13 wickets (best 4/14) in the manner of a medieval knight who insists on jousting before breakfast, raiding a village before lunch, and still being home in time to carve the roast beef.

**Tom Hatch** (12 wickets, best of 4/12) bowled with relentless persistence — if patience is a virtue, Tom has it in stock. **Sam Collidge** (10 wickets) chipped in with miserly spells, as if rationing runs in wartime.

#### Stands to Remember

The season's highlight partnership was **Trevethan and Holmes** stand of 78 against East Prawle — less a partnership than a small work of art, reminiscent of Castor and Pollux sticking together through thick and thin, though with rather more running between the wickets.

**Hatch and Compston's** 59 against Cornwood was another tale of unlikely comradeship, like Caesar and Antony deciding they rather enjoyed sharing a tent. **Bell and Lemmings'** 32 against Ermington was shorter but no less spirited, a quick skirmish rather than a campaign.

#### **Curtain Down**

And so, as the last stump is drawn, we pack away the kit. There were runs, wickets, ducks and dropped chances — the full classical drama. There were days of triumph, days of disaster, and days when the scorer's pencil wore down quicker than the opposition's batting order.

Yet through it all, Modbury played with the good cheer of men who know that, like Rome, a cricket club is not built in a day.



#### **Bumblebees & Pizza**



We all appreciate the valuable work that honeybees do out in the farmers' fields and orchards, pollinating their crops and also producing the wonderful golden honey for our morning toast; but let's not overlook the contribution that our humble wild bumblebees make in helping to produce the 'five a day' we need on our plates. Whilst a managed hive of honeybees may contain up to 50,000 bees, a bumblebee nest may only support 50-100 bees, depending on the weather, food source and nest habitat available.

- o There are 24 surviving species of bumblebee in the UK, some unique to specific regions.
- o Two species are already extinct.
- o Each species has a different tongue length, some short, some long, which enables them, as a group, to feed from a wide source of flowers, and in turn they pollinate a huge variety of plants.
- o The single species of honeybee in the UK have short tongues which only allows them to feed on open flowers, limiting the range of plants they are able to pollinate.
- **o** Bumblebees also have a unique ability to vibrate their thorax known as "buzz pollination" which make them extremely effective at pollinating tomato plants and increasing yields.
- o Bumblebees have no need to store honey as the colony will die off naturally at the end of the summer.
- o Only the new bumblebee queens will survive and after hibernating during the winter months, will hopefully emerge the following spring and produce new colonies.
- o Bumblebees can tolerate cooler temperatures so will also be active earlier and later in the year, so by providing some plants for late and early flowering we can help them to thrive. Winter heather, sedums, aster (for late) and single hellebores, crocus, aconites, grape hyacinths (for early) would be a good start.

It is estimated that up to 65,000 colonies of bumblebees are imported each year into the UK from Europe to assist glass house growers with pollination of tomato plants and other soft fruits.

The risk is that the imported bumblebees can introduce lethal viruses to our native wild bees. Whilst the imported bumblebees are restricted to the glass houses and polytunnels, and should never be released, inevitably some will manage to escape and endanger our wild bee colonies.

Our remaining 24 species of native bumblebees need some help, so next time you have a family pizza and film night, or reach for the passata for bolognese, or ketchup for a hot dog, spare a thought for the humble bumblebee. Whilst many young children are not so keen on tomatoes, tell them how reliant we are on bumblebees for their pizza and many other of their favourite foods.

There are plenty of simple things we can all do to help protect our wild bumblebees, such as providing suitable habitat for nest sites and planting a few of their favourite plants in the garden/or tub; one or two **for each season** of the year will be really beneficial.

There is an endless choice of bee-loving perennial plants and bulbs that will come back year after year and if you grow vegetables and can allow two or three of your onions, leeks and brassicas to go to seed the bees and other pollinators will flock to them. Take a look at the planting guide at:


